Dear Friend

In fact, Christians have become divided in their thinking about Christmas. Some are so tired of its commercialisation that they want to give up on it and hand it over to the shops. Others want to salvage it and use it to say something important about the birth of Jesus to a weary secular world. I, for one, take my place with the second group.

The story is told of how many years ago an old American pioneer travelled westward across the Great Plains until he came to an abrupt halt at the edge of the Grand Canyon. He looked in awe and wonder at the sight before him – a vast chasm one mile deep, eighteen miles across and stretching out towards the horizon. He gasped "Something big must have happened here!"

At this Christmas season, anyone who stops to look or listen, must ask the same question about what all the hustle and bustle is about. A thoughtful man or woman, seeing the Christmas lights, the decorations, hearing the Christmas Carols or attending worship might also conclude, "Something big must have happened here!"

Of course something big did happen, and the world needs to hear about it. God, in the person of His son Jesus came to this world. This is what John says 'The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His glory, the glory of the One and Only who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.' (John 1:14). And the reason why he came was to die for our sins...that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. (John 3:16)

It's the best news ever! God became one of us that we might live forever with Him. The angels described this as being 'good tidings of great joy....to all people' (Luke 2:10)

It is my prayer that you will know God's blessing this Christmas and throughout 2019 as we seek to make Christ known.

Romanian Reunion

In 1993, 25 years ago this year, William McDowell and others from Northern Ireland were involved in a building project in Romania.

This project involved renovating an orphanage for children in Targu Mures. William was involved in the plumbing and heating of the orphanage where many children lived for most of their young lives and a short time after.

William and a number of other men used their practical, God given skills to ensure that a secure building was in place for these homeless children.

To mark the occasion, these men were invited back to Romania to share in the 25th Anniversary celebrations. They were away for eight days. They attended a service in the Hungarian Reformed Church to mark this. Over the years, William has been there 13 times to see the work progress and to see how the orphanage continues to operate, offering opportunities for the children to learn and make something of their lives which in the early days was, to say the least, difficult.

The orphanage was known as Lidia Children Home, called this after the girl who was a founder member and initially ran it and also the Bible character.

This was a particularly poignant time in William's experience, as he made contact with Betty, one of the children he knew, now 30 years old. She had done well for herself and was now working in a nursing home in Reading, England.

So often people are involved in projects that we don't know about and we would like to thank William for sharing with us this time around.

It is attributed to a Japanese Christian lady called Toki Miyashina, little else is known of her other than that her interpretation of the psalm was written around the mid-1960s. It is not a direct translation but a reworking of the psalm to reflect our need to rely on the Lord in the everyday bustle of our lives.

Over the years I have revisited it regularly and it helps me to step back, take stock of what is driving my life and where my focus should be. I really love the lines;

There is such a strong message that whatever our pressures are each day, no matter what our daily routines are, we have no need to worry if we have committed our lives and are in step with the Lord as he will be walking with us.

I trust that as you read the words they will impact you and that you may reflect on the balance of your life, who you are relying on for your peace and if you are walking "in the pace of the Lord."









Rasul comes from a Muslim family. From age three his father took him by the hand to go to the mosque. Even from an early age he had to listen to the Mullah in

quietness whilst there. He continued in obedience. As he grew older he began to question all that was said but his father could give him no answers. This made him more inquisitive. In school his best friend was a Christian so he voiced his questions to him and as they grew older they had long discussions on who God was, the environment, current events and all things relevant. He began to get answers to his many questions. One night he had a dream. He was in the desert and a man in bright white with no face appeared to him in kindness. He held his hand and told him to follow him. When he awoke he was startled to think that this was the Jesus his friend kept telling him about. Weeks later his mother came to him worried for his welfare. Was he ill? Did he need help? Something was wrong in his life. His mother had a dream, the same dream as himself - which caused her trouble knowing the boy holding the man's hand was probably Rasul. Contd.,

Was this boy possibly Rasul? When she told Rasul of her dream, it was Rasul's confirmation that this man was Jesus and that He was wanting to lead him to follow him. He was full of confidence and peace. Only days later in school, a girl he had never known sat beside him, and without hesitation she said "are you Rasul?" This startled him and he asked how she knew him? She told him she had a vision in her sleep and a man in a brilliant robe but with no face, appeared holding the hand of a boy named Rasul. This scared him so much he ran out of the room so fast to a quiet area to ponder the same dream appearing three times!!! For the first time he cried out to Jesus and affirmed that he would follow him whatever the price. At that point he clearly asked God to take control of his life. That was two years ago.

At an extended family gathering, he mixed well and hardly declared his new-found faith in Jesus. When everyone left, his elder brother was given instruction by his father to beat Rasul, even if it meant death, and that he must leave the family home as he was no longer part of the family. In obedience, his brother approached him and told him he was to beat him and in response Rasul told him to do as instructed, but to give him just five minutes alone. His brother knew he would be praying to this Christian Jesus, and in growing fear he waited. Then he beat him badly, leaving him in a severe way. Rasul gathered his few belongings and left to find his Christian friend. After four days his brother found him and said he had

convinced their father that he was a good person and to please let him return home. By then his Christian friends realised he was in a difficult position but told him to return and to see them daily.

With his friends growing friendship, they knew he was not safe and the local pastor put his name forward to enrol in the Moldova Christian University, which he did. This is his first year there.

Rasul is enrolled in the Business and Theology courses, believing this will best prepare him to serve His Saviour amongst his people upon return home. His one belief is that he is to be equipped as a missionary to the Tadjik people and with this confidence he loves the Biblical teaching and sharing fellowship with the many Central Asian students.

Please pray for this young 19 year-old who's love for God grows. Aware that though the path ahead may be difficult, pray that the comforter, guide and the fresh water of Jesus will nourish him as he grows into the likeness of our LORD.






Everyone welcome to our Messy Christmas Event on Saturday 15th December at 4.30pm
