The Minister's Desk

Dear friends

If then you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth. (Colossians 3:1-2)

Most of us look forward to the summer break away from the busyness of church life, just to down tools and take a break. Handled properly summer can be a time for physical and spiritual renewal, handled poorly it can become a flight from Jesus into Christless leisure which leaves the soul parched. At first it may seem like a small thing to skimp on prayer and neglect the Word.

The payback for this is: shallowness, powerlessness, vulnerability to sin, preoccupation with



trifles, and a frightening loss of interest in worship and the things of the Spirit. So don't let this summer make your soul shrivel.

Keeping Jesus as our focus is the way to a refreshing summer. He is preeminent in all things (Colossians 1:18) and that includes our summer holidays. We long for rest and Jesus invites us this summer to: "Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). We long to renew our strength and He promises us that, "they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run andnot be weary; they shall walk

and not faint." (Isaiah 40:31) We long for days of refreshing this summer but forget that the scripture tells us repent "therefore and return, that your sins may be wiped away, in order that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord" (Acts 3:19). Repentance is not just turning away from sin, but also turning toward the Lord with hearts open and expectant and submissive. This is the ultimate in summer refreshment! The question is - do we want

it? That is what we must ask ourselves. Jesus Christ gives himself to us in proportion to how much we want his refreshment. "You will seek me and find me, when you seek me with all your heart" (Jeremiah 29:13). Paul writing to the church in Colossae instructed them to have a particular mindset:, "If then you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the

right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not

on the things that are on earth." (Colossians 3:1-2)

CORK VISIT 2018











I really enjoy the springtime, isn't it amazing to see the new birth of nature - hedgerows spirting their first green shoots and little lambs skipping about in the fields - God's creation is truly wonderful!

The beginning of the year brought doctor appointments and hospital visits and whilst I had a lot going on in my head, I had a great sense of peace and clam. In Hebrews 13 v 5 we read "Never will I leave you, never will I forsake you". I held on to this promise, however there were times when I felt less positive, feeling weary and a bit weepy (it's good to have a wee cry sometimes!) and just wanted everything to be back to normal but that was not God's plan for me. I had to trust that God was in control and lean on His promise -"Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding and in all your



ways acknowledge Him and He will direct your paths". I simply had to let God be God who IS able to strengthen us in every circumstance and give us the courage to face our fears.

We will all experience our own forms of 'Cancer' at some stage in our lives, should that be ill health, relationship/family problems, sadness, loneliness to name a few and they may take you to a place of fear, despair and helplessness but if we change the 'C' of cancer to that of CHRIST where there is hope and joy we have a completely different outlook.

The psalmist tells us that "when doubt filled my mind your comfort gave me renewed hope and cheer". I do recall times when I was not aware of God's presence near to me, but on reflection He was there carrying me in the form of a visitor, receiving a card with words of encouragement or a phone call or text - He was there with me! May I take this opportunity to thank my Trinity family for all the practical and prayerful support I received - it was amazing!

We are almost halfway through 2019 and to date this year has opened up a new chapter for me with restored health and early retirement and I thank God every day for His many blessings and although at times our struggles may be great, God's blessings will always be greater.

I thank God that I am able to walk with confidence knowing that I have a wonderful Saviour who loves me unconditionally and I pray that in each of our walks with God that we will keep our focus on Him and be responsive to his calling and the plans that he has for us.

United Appeal for Mission - INSPIRING!

I have just returned from the General Assembly inspired by mission projects being supported by

our contributions to United Appeal for Mission. As you know United Appeal supports Mission at home and overseas.

Through the Council for Global Mission we have 22 global mission personnel, working in ten counties, all of whom have a clear outreach focus to their work. The most recent missionaries being Chris and Rachel Humphries who have joined James and Heather Cochrane in Portugal. Global Mission also continues to invest resources in leadership training in countries where the church is growing. During 2019 the church committed to training scholarships in India, Kenya, Myanmar, Malawi, Nepal and Indonesia. Recently, Global Mission set up a Church Planting and Evangelism task group to look at church planting opportunities in Europe.

The Council for Mission in Ireland supports Home Mission, Irish Mission, deaconesses and projects like the International Meeting Point, South Belfast Friendship House and Nightlight. It supports the provision of a chaplaincy service in universities and colleges, the healthcare system, prison and the armed forces. The Council also seeks to sharpen the denomination's missional focus across Ireland. One recent development is the setting up of a Panel on Church Planting to develop a strategy to plant new churches in Ireland. It has already begun its work under the banner - 'New life, New People, New Places'.

On Tuesday evening of the Assembly, the Council for Congregational Life and Witness gave an excellent presentation of the materials it has developed for use in congregations. Much of the material has been compiled to help mission minded congregations engage with the world outside our gates.

Please pray for these, and many other, mission initiatives that they will be blessed by God and that He will build His kingdom at home and overseas. But in addition to prayer please plan to give to United Appeal for Mission.

The target for 2019 is £3,550,000, of which our share here in Trinity is £11,664. Please give generously so that we not only meet this target but go the 'extra mile' in our support for mission.


